

The Regulation of King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok Concerning Student Dress Code, 2011 (B.E. 2554)

The common representations of the organizational identity, prestige and dignity of students at King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok are perceived through the emblem derived from H.M. King Mongkut's Privy seal graciously granted to the university by the royal endorsement of His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej's. Beside, the institution status was transformed into a state autonomous university according to the 2007 Act of King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok.

Considering the unique features and the proposition in Articles 22(2) and 65 of the 2007 Act of King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok in conjunction with the resolution of the university council in the meeting no.5/2011 on 22 July 2010, the university then enacts the following regulations:

Item 1 The regulation is called "The Regulation Concerning Student Dress Code at King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok, 2011 (B.E. 2554).

Item 2 The regulation shall come into force as from the date following its promulgation in the Government Gazette.

Item 3 The 2001 Regulation of King Mongkut's Institute of Technology North Bangkok on Student Dress code is, henceforth, annulled. Any prior contradictory rules, orders, announcements or resolutions are superseded by this regulation.

Item 4 in this regulation, the following terms of reference are used:

"University" refers to King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok.

"Faculty" refers to the organization as stated in the Announcement of King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok about the establishment of the learning and teaching organizations under the University.

"President" refers to the President of King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok.

"Students" refers to the students of King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok.

"Full-time student curricula" refers to the curricula in which undergraduate courses are offered during the government office hours. Pertaining degrees will be granted after graduation.

"Part-time student curricula" refers to the curricula in which undergraduate courses are offered after government office hours (evening schedule). Pertaining degrees will be granted after graduation.

"Ceremony" refers to the ceremonies the university or other organizations arrange to celebrate special events or festivals, but which are not considered to be official government or royal ceremonies.

"Royal ceremony" refers to a traditional royal ceremony that is commemorated regularly each year.

"Government ceremony" refers to a traditional ceremony regularly held by the government.

"Being polite" refers to the quality of being neat, polite and conducting oneself with propriety, in accordance with university regulations for student discipline and/or traditional requirements.

Item 5 according to these regulations, the President is responsible for supervision and holds the authority to issue or state additional principles in enforcing the regulations. In the event that problems arise in considering or interpreting these regulations, the President will be the authorized person whose judgment is considered final.

Section 1 General Section

Item 6 The student dress code policy shall apply to all full-time undergraduate students. However, part-time/evening undergraduate student may either wear a uniform or choose to dress politely and appropriately.

Item 7 The wearing of student uniform, emblems and clothing which is different from those stated in this regulation will be announced by the university or the faculty on a case-by-case basis.

Section 2 Student Dress Code

Item 8 Student dress codes for various occasions are defined below:

(1) A regular student uniform is to be worn for regular classes, during the formal examination period, during office hours and at public and official functions.

(2) A workshop uniform is compulsory for all students following workshop sessions, laboratory practice or Physical Education.

(3) A formal uniform should be worn by students when attending any university ceremony and other formal occasions as announced by the University.

Item 9 Dress code for male students:

(1) Hairstyle: Male students should have short hair that does not grow beyond the collar. Unnatural Hair coloring is unacceptable. Students should be clean shaven. Beards and moustaches are not permitted except when they are associated by prevailing cultural-religious traditions.

(2) Shirt: Open-collar short or long-sleeved shirt, made out of pure white cloth with no design and of an appropriate thickness and length. The shirt must be tucked in neatly.

(3) Necktie: Made out of dark blue cloth with the university logo. The necktie length, width and style shall conform to Uniform Requirements.

(4) Pants: long, regular-fit pants, polite style with no design. They are made out of black or dark blue cloth and attached with similar fabric belt loops. Cuffed pants, pleated pants and jeans are not allowed.

(5) Belt: Black belt with the University buckle.

(6) Shoes: Plain black or dark brown, closed-heel, polite style

(7) Socks: Plain black, dark brown or white

Item 10 Dress code for female students:

(1) Hairstyle: simple and no unnatural hair colors.

(2) Head covering: Muslim female students are allowed to observe a traditional hijab. The head-dress worn must be of a plain white pattern, with the university pin clipped on the left side.

(3) Blouse: Plain white blouse, open collar with fairly thick fabric. Length of the sleeves is above the elbow, with bottom edge of each sleeve folded over. The blouse front has a 30-mm. edge on which 5 buttons are fastened. The blouse must not be too tight. Length of the blouse is longer than the waist so it can be completely tucked into the skirt.

(4) Skirt: Appropriate-length, plain dark blue or black skirt . plain black or navy blue. Denim skirts are not allowed.

(5) Buttons: silver-colored metal buttons, 17- mm in diameter. The style complies with dress code practice.

(6) University pin: a silver colored pin of 23x30 mm crown emblem is worn on the front left side of the blouse

(7) Belt: leather black belt with the university logo on the metal buckle

(8) Shoes: polite color and style, either closed-heel or ankle strap shoes.

Section 3

Dress code for workshops and for Physical Education practical classes

Item 11 The clothing for male students in the workshop:

(1) Hairstyle, as described in item ((1)

(2) Shirt, open collar shirt, short sleeves above the elbow and no splits at the end of sleeves. The shirt is made of thick cloth and meets at the hips. The university emblem is embroidered on the right chest: only the crown of the emblem is embroidered with orange-colored silk. Under the embroidered emblem the university name, King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok, is displayed, followed by the name of the faculty where students are enrolled. There are also three pleated pockets on the shirt: one on the upper left and the other two on the lower right and left. On the back of the shirt, there are double pleats on both sides with a long waistband over the pleats. (Any other designs not approved by the university are prohibited on the shirt.) The shirt should be neatly worn and always buttoned up. If a T-shirt inside is worn inside, the T-shirt needs to be plain white without patterns.

(3) Trousers, as described in item 9(4) . Neatly and properly worn.

(4) Belt, as described in item 9(5).

(5) Shoes: Leather shoes or sneakers with polite colored socks, e.g. blue, brown or black

Item 12 The clothing of female students in the workshop:

(1) Hairstyle, as described in item 10(1).

(2) Shirt, as described in item 11(2). The shirt should be neatly worn and always buttoned up.

(3) Skirt or trousers: worn properly, as indicated by the faculty. Jeans are prohibited.

(4) Belt, as described in item 10(7).

(5) Shoes: Leather shoes, polite sneakers or shoes as described in item 10(8) .

Item 13 The clothing of female and male students in physical education classes:

(1) Hairstyle, as described in item 9(1) and item 10(1).

(2) Polo shirt: A collared polo shirt with short sleeves above the elbow. The shirt is made of thick, stretchable cloth. The style and color of the shirt are in accordance with the university instructions. The polo shirt should always be tucked inside the trousers.

(3) Trousers: Full-length trousers made of stretchable fabric. The style and color comply with instructions.

(4) Shoes: Leather shoes or polite colored sneakers. Blue, brown or black socks are permitted.

Section 4

Student dress code for ceremonies, royal ceremonies or government ceremonies

Item 14 Male and female students who participate in the University's ceremonies of the university should dress according to the rules as described in items 9 or 10, on a case-by-case basis

Item 15 Student dress code for royal or governmental ceremonies:

(1) Male students

a. Hairstyle, as described in item 9(1).

b. Shirt: white long-sleeved official coat

c. Collar pin: 18 x22 mm. gold-colored emblems are attached to both sides of the collar

d. Buttons: gold-colored metal, 21- mm diameter with university logo. (5 buttons)

e. Trousers: white, regular fit, uncuffed trousers with side pockets, long enough to cover shoe heels

f. Shoes: Plain, black leather lace up shoes without metal accessories, worn with black socks.

(2) Female students

a. Hair: Hair style as described in item 10(1).

b. Blouse: as described in item 10(3), with a buttoned-up blouse collar

c. Skirt: Plain navy blue skirt without pleats, covering the knees.

d. Button: as depict in item10(5)

e. University Pin: as defined in item 10(6)

f. Belt: as in item 10(7)

g. Shoes: lady formal shoes, plain black leather, high or low heeled, worn with stockings.
